## Acknowledgement



We acknowledge that our engagement activities were held on the lands of the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin nation who are the traditional custodians of the land which is now known as Banyule today. We pay our respects to Elders, past, present and emerging.

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## 1. Executive summary

The Engagement Collective was engaged by Banyule City Council to support the planning and facilitation of a range of community engagement activities to inform the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library (library).

The purpose of Stage 2 engagement was to gather community input about what they value and their aspirations for the new library; preferences regarding materials and finishes for the new building and internal allocation of library space, fit out, functioning, community use and programming; as well as suggestions for the streetscape and outdoor spaces. People who live, work and study in Rosanna and library users were identified as the target population to engage in this public consultation.

A range of online and in-person consultation activities took place from May to June 2021. Council's 'Shaping Banyule' online engagement platform was used to support the consultation.

## 1.1 Overview of participation profile

The communications and engagement activities were effective in engaging over 300 participants. It is noted that some individuals participated in more than one engagement activity.

Demographic details were not submitted by or captured for all participants, so the participation profile has been generated mostly based on the characteristics reported by the 129 survey respondents (108 survey and 21 short survey):

- The majority of participants identified as *female* (72 or 60.5%).
- Participants were a variety of ages. All age groupings were represented from under 12 years to 70 years and over. Persons aged *35 to 49 years* were particularly engaged (37 or 25.7%).
- A small number of respondents identified as a *person who speaks English as a second language, LGBTIQ+* and/or *a person with a disability.*
- Participants indicated that they had varied connection/s to Rosanna. The majority *lived in Rosanna* (88 or 74.6%) and some participants *worked* or *studied in Rosanna*. Other connections reported included living in nearby suburbs, volunteering in Rosanna or catching the train in Rosanna.

## **1.2** Key findings from the analysis of the community feedback

Current connections to, and uses of, Rosanna Library (see 4.1)

- Many participants identified as a member of Yarra Plenty Regional Library (87 or 84.7%)
- While some participants reported using the library at least once per week (23 or 22.3%), many reported using the library rarely (32 or 31.1%) or on a monthly basis (24 or 23.3%)
- Participants indicated that they were doing a variety of programs or activities other than borrowing books at the Rosanna Library now. Many of the 103 respondents reported they read magazines and newspapers, attend Storytime (25 or 29.8% each) and/or used the computers (21 or 25.0%).

Things that we love and value now about the Rosanna Library (see 4.2)

Participants indicated they love and value a variety of aspects now about the Rosanna Library. Topics reported related to services, spaces, programs as well as the look and feel of the library. Topics referenced most frequently across all engagement activities for each category were (in descending order):

Other topics frequently mentioned: *it is convenient, close proximity to home and public transport*, and *the location*.

Views about the new Rosanna Library, looking to the future (see 4.3)

Participants indicated they would like to have a variety of experiences and things to do in the new Rosanna Library. Topics reported related to services, spaces, programs as well as the look and feel of the library. Topics referenced most frequently across all engagement activities for each category were (in descending order):

Level of support and views about the proposed redevelopment of Rosanna Library (see 4.4.) A majority of participants indicated they were supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library and concept designs:

- 48 (or 49.0%) were very supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 28 (or 28.6%) were supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 5 (or 5.1%) were *neutral* about the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 5 (or 5.1%) were *unsupportive* of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 12 (or 12.2%) were very unsupportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library

When participants were asked to explain why they chose a particular level of support there were 32 of the 98 (32%) who indicated concerns with several aspects of the project.

Feedback on the proposed concept plans and ideas (see 4.5)

The majority of participants indicated they liked the Rosanna Library concept designs.

There were also a range of mixed views, ideas and queries recorded:

- At the pop-ups 71 or (86.6%) indicated they *liked* the concept designs
- Many of the 12 student participants indicated they preferred the *Deck* and *Study lounge spaces* (7 votes each) and *Children's areas* and *Reading terraces* (6 votes each)

Other ideas included: incorporating visual representation of Aboriginal Culture to uplift inclusion; natural building materials; quiet and noise tolerant areas; disabled parking near the lift; spaces for volunteers, tutors, professional services, wellness room and wet areas for art activities.

Ideas about the streetscape and outdoor spaces (see 4.6)

Participants provided a variety of personalised ideas for the streetscape and outdoor spaces at the proposed Rosanna Library. Ideas and suggestions referred to the following topics (presented in descending order):

- Landscaping: Trees, vegetation and greenery
- <u>Accessibility, pedestrian, bicycle and vehicles movements:</u> Parking and car parks, pedestrian crossings, accessibility, cycling connections and infrastructure
- <u>Building exterior and surrounds:</u> Use of natural materials, re-purposing the blue stone, directional signage, welcoming appearance, artwork, flags, sustainability elements, dog parking and book return chute
- <u>Outdoor spaces and facilities:</u> Seating, green and open spaces, performing/entertainment area, play area/playground and café

Other ideas included: increasing the set back of the buildings from the road and waste management.

General feedback relating to the overall project and future stages (see 4.7) Across all engagement activities, concerns were raised regarding five topics in relation to the overall project and future stages about:

- 1. The partnership with Woolworths and sale of land
- 2. The concept design for the proposed library
- 3. The new Woolworths supermarket and implications
- 4. The loss of trees
- 5. The consultation process

## 2. Project background and overview of consultation

## 2.1 Background


In April 2021, Banyule City Council publicly announced the proposed redevelopment of the Rosanna Library via a Council meeting. The library is proposed to be redeveloped through a potential partnership with Woolworths. This partnership would involve transferring a portion of Council land to Woolworths (828 sqm of the current library site), for them to build a larger supermarket as well as design and construct a new public library building next door.

It is envisaged that the new Rosanna Library would be more than double the size of the existing library and include a range of new spaces, services and programs to compliment a modern community facility.

The results of engagement will inform the library redevelopment concept plans and the Turnham Avenue Streetscape Plan. Initial upgrades to the Turnham Avenue streetscape were delivered as part of the level crossing removal project. An updated streetscape concept plan has been developed to include other improvements for the areas outside the proposed supermarket and library. It is proposed that most parts of the updated streetscape plan will be delivered as part of this project.

In addition to the library and Turnham Avenue streetscape, the project also involves improvements to the Heidelberg Theatre Company, with Council allocating \$1 million for these upgrade works.

In April 2021, Council also endorsed an engagement plan which indicated the level of engagement for each of the four project stages, as shown below.



In Stage 1 (April), the level of engagement was inform. This Stage involved:

- Announcing the project
- Providing information to residents
- Council hosting 10 information sessions, attended by around 80 people
- Providing information on the "Shaping Banyule" consultation platform including direct contact details for a Council staff member.

In Stage 2 (May to July), the level of engagement was consult. ChatterBox Projects (through the Engagement Collective) was engaged by Council to plan and support the community consultation for Stage 2. Activities were led by both Council staff and the consultants. This feedback is the focus on this report. Stage 2 engagement primarily sought early input and ideas from the community about what they would like to see or do in a new library and how they would like a new library and surrounds to look and feel.

**In Stage 3 engagement (3a, 3b, 3c – July 2021 to 2023), the level of engagement will be consult.** This Stage involves legal and statutory planning processes where the community will be able to provide specific feedback on the sale of land to Woolworths and development plans as part of the planning permit process.

## In Stage 4 engagement (2023 to 2024), the level of engagement will be inform.

## 2.2 Engagement purpose and objectives

The purpose of Stage 2 community engagement was to gather feedback on:

- what people value and their aspirations for the new library
- preferred materials and finishes for the new library building
- internal allocation of library space, fit out, functioning, community use and programming; and
- suggestions for the streetscape and outdoor spaces at the new library e.g. trees, signage and car parking (including improvements to Turnham Avenue Streetscape Concept Plan)

The objectives of Stage 2 engagement were to:

- continue to inform the community and key stakeholders about the project
- ensure the community was clear about what they could influence the negotiables and non-negotiables
- engage a diversity of stakeholders to hear a range of views and ideas
- support the community to provide feedback in a range of ways
- identify and understand potential concerns in relation to the library redevelopment; and
- generate community excitement about the new library.

The negotiables and non-negotiables for Stage 2 engagement are shown in Table 2.

The focus of the Stage 2 engagement was to seek input and ideas in relation to the "negotiables" for the proposed library redevelopment and surrounding streetscape. However, comments were also received regarding:

- partnership with Woolworths
- sale of public land
- Woolworths in Rosanna, vehicle movement and parking implications
- loss of trees
- overall project and future stages

Although not directly related to the objectives of the Stage 2 engagement, this feedback was recorded and has been analysed and presented throughout Section 4.

## 2.3 Overview of consultation program

ChatterBox Projects in partnership with Council planned and delivered a range of engagement activities from 8 May to 8 June, as shown in Table 3.

Three place-based pop-ups were designed to intercept community members in busy locations in Rosanna. These were conducted at the Rosanna Parklands, Rosanna plaza/shopping strip and Rosanna train station. Combined, the pop-ups engaged over 220 people (via voting pod, Chatboards, idea drawing sheets, surveys and short surveys) and provided the opportunity for many community members to have conversations, ask questions, seek clarification on a range of issues and topics and take information and surveys home.

Drop-in sessions were designed so community members could visit four different information stations and speak with a Council staff member and/or a Woolworths representative. At the session people could provide feedback via post-it-notes at various stations and complete a survey. The information stations were:

- The process information and questions about the stages of the project
- Library development feedback, information and questions about the concept plans
- The streetscape feedback, information and questions about the areas outside the library and supermarket
- The partnership information and questions about the partnership with Woolworths

Persons who registered for Drop-in session 2 were invited to a substitute online workshop, however this did not proceed due to low interest. Those who expressed interest were offered a phone conversation with Council's key contact person.

School workshops were designed to provide school children with an easy option to participate and provide feedback. The on-site school workshop involved gathering feedback via post-it notes, dotmocracy activity (use dots to vote) and idea drawing sheets.

Pop-ins were designed so Council staff could share information, answer questions and provide community members with a survey to complete or take home.

#### During the engagement activities, feedback was gathered via a range of activities:

- 1. Survey (online via the Shaping Banyule consultation platform and hard copy)
- 2. Short survey (3 questions, hard copy)
- 3. Ideas drawing sheet (hard copy)
- 4. Place-based pop-ups (survey, short survey, voting pod, Chatboards, ideas drawing sheet)
- 5. Drop in session (post-it ideas)
- 6. School workshop (dotmocracy voting activity, post-it ideas, ideas drawing sheet)
- 7. Stakeholder meeting (meeting notes)
- 8. Email submission

The feedback gathered at each engagement activity is shown in Table 4.

## In Stage 2, efforts were also made to inform and promote the consultation:

- Social media posts (2 with story surveys)
- Information stands at the library and Fire Station Community House
- Mail out to over 8,000 local households

These activities complimented Council's online Shaping Banyule consultation platform. The platform included the online survey, a video, FAQ's, information about the engagement activities and process as well as contact details for Council's key contact person.

The engagement was also supported by posts on Council's social media channels, Facebook and Instagram. Posts were published as an awareness campaign to direct the audience to the Shaping Banyule page. Story surveys and polls were included as part of some weekly Instagram posts to encourage feedback and ideas via this online medium. Table 5 presents an overview of the social media posts and reach.


## 3. Description of participation profile

## Key insights

- The majority of participants identified as *female* (72 or 60.5%)
- Participants were a variety of ages. All age groupings were represented from under 12 years to 70 years and over. Persons aged *35 to 49 years* were particularly engaged (37 or 25.7%)
- Some participants selected diversity characteristics (access, inclusion and equity). A small number of respondents identified as a person who speaks English as a second language, LGBTIQ+ and/or a person with a disability
- Participants indicated that they have varied connection/s to Rosanna. The majority *live in Rosanna* (88 or 74.6%) and some participants *work* or *study*. Other connections reported included living in nearby suburbs, volunteering in Rosanna or catching the train in Rosanna

## 3.1 Gender of participants


**Survey respondents and short survey respondents** were asked to indicate their gender. All genders were represented. As shown in Graph 1, of the 119 respondents who indicated their gender, females were particularly engaged (72 or 60.5%).

## 3.2 Age of participants


**Survey respondents, short survey respondents and idea drawing sheet participants** were asked to indicate their age grouping. All age groupings were represented. As shown in Graph 2, of the 144 participants who indicated their age, persons aged 35 to 49 years were particularly engaged (37 or 25.7%).

## 3.3 Access, inclusion and equity characteristics


**Survey respondents** were asked to indicate their diversity characteristics. As shown in Graph 3, all diversity characteristics were represented with the exception of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

## 3.4 Connection/s to Rosanna

**Survey respondents and short survey respondents** were asked to indicate their connection/s to Rosanna. All connection types were represented. As shown in Graph 4, of the 118 respondents who indicated a connection, the majority reported living in Rosanna (88 or 74.6%).

## 4. Findings from the analysis of the community feedback


This section reports the findings from the analysis of the community feedback gathered via survey (online and hard copy formats), short survey, and place-based pop-up engagement activities.

## 4.1 Current connections to, and uses of, Rosanna Library

## <u>Key insights</u>

- Many participants identified as a *member of Yarra Plenty Regional Library* (87 or 84.7%)
- While some participants reported using the library at least once per week (23 or 22.3%), many reported using the library rarely (32 or 31.1%) or on a monthly basis (24 or 23.3%)
- Participants indicated that they were doing a variety of programs or activities other than borrowing books at the Rosanna Library now. Many of the 103 respondents reported they *Read magazines and newspapers, attended Storytime* (25 or 29.8% each) and/or *Use the computers* (21 or 25.0%)


**Survey respondents** were asked "Are you a member of the Yarra Plenty Regional Library?". As shown in Graph 5, of the 103 respondents who answered this question, the majority (87 or 84.5%) indicated Yes.

**Survey respondents** were asked "How often do you use the Rosanna Library?" As shown in Graph 6, all of the prescribed response options were selected. While some of the 103 respondents use the library at least once per week (23 or 22.3%), many respondents reported using the library *rarely* (32 or 31.1%) or on a *monthly* basis (24 or 23.3%).






The seven survey respondents who indicated **Other** provided the following explanations:

- Not a user yet but probably soon
- Just moved here
- Will join soon!
- Via Book Club kits
- Currently occasionally
- Varies at different times
- Rarely now but previously weekly



**Survey respondents** were asked "What programs or activities other than borrowing books do you do or participate in at the Rosanna Library now? (select all that apply)". As shown in Graph 7, all of the prescribed response options were selected. Many of the 103 respondents reported *Read magazines and newspapers, attended Storytime* (25 or 29.8% each) and/or *Use the computers* (21 or 25.0%).

## 4.2 What we love and value now about the Rosanna Library

Topics referenced most frequently across all engagement activities for each category are (in descending order):

Services:

- Technology, free Wi-Fi, access to computers, ipads and photocopying
- Friendly and helpful staff

### Feel:

- Quiet, uncrowded, relaxed and cosy
- Community feel, welcoming and friendly
- Child-friendly atmosphere

#### Spaces:

- Variety of spaces (open spaces, meeting spaces, quiet spaces)
- Spaces to work, study and do homework

#### Programs:

• Programs, activities, classes, events and clubs

#### Look:

- Trees, greenery and bush feel
- Building character and bluestone
- Furniture, seating and tables

Other topics frequently mentioned were: *it is convenient, close proximity to home and public transport*; and *the location*.

**Survey respondents and short survey respondents** were asked "What do you love and value now about the Rosanna Library?" and invited to provide a personalised response. A total of 116 participants provided a response and referred to 218 items.

## 4.3 Views about the new Rosanna Library, looking to the future

### Key insights

Participants indicated they would like to have a variety of experiences and things to do in the new Rosanna Library. Topics reported related to services, spaces, programs as well as the look and feel of the library. Topics referenced most frequently across all engagement activities for each category are (in descending order):

<u>Look</u>

- Modern, inviting, clean, safe and warm
- Bright, airy with natural light and spacious
- Aligned character of area with natural and sustainable materials, natural colours and greenery
- Accessible for people of all-abilities and prams, including disabled car parks

### <u>Spaces</u>

- Quiet areas for reading and studying
- Variety of spaces and seating styles some that are child-friendly, some for community use and social interaction and others for private use or meetings, which can be hired or booked

#### <u>Services</u>

- Variety of book collections, reading materials and options
- Technology and internet (free Wi-Fi, access to computers, ipads, DVDs, movies, printers and photocopiers)
- Storytime

<u>Feel</u>

- Inclusive, welcoming, friendly and safe
- Quiet, comfortable, relaxed and calm
- Programs
- Arts and craft classes, homework and clubs, language classes, writing classes, classes and courses for all age groups, school holiday programs and adult learning programs art classes
- Activities for children, community events, guest speakers and presentations

**Survey respondents and short survey respondents** were asked "What kind of experiences would you like to have or what would you like to do in the new Rosanna Library?" and invited to provide a personalised response. A total of 108 respondents answered this question and referred to 207 items.

- Fix the rest of Rosanna village that has now been destroyed in the last 13+ months of works. Darker, earthy colours with natural materials (not stark white concrete and bright orange) and plant proper plants including replacing all the trees that were cut down, not chip bark and grass.
- I am one of the few who do not need bells and whistles to attend a library
- I have also used the library bus that would come to Olympic Village in the past
- I would need to know what was on offer.
- Include cafe or coffee stand and areas for local mother's group meetings. Libraries are such a
  wonderful supportive hub for mums and a can be fundamental in helping kids form a love for books.
  Whilst young adults may be moving to electronic formats, childrens books are likely to stay an integral
  part of early education.
- Make it inviting!! Exciting. A place that people you see as part of the environment and not apart. A place that exudes welcome and makes locals proud to talk about this wonderful community asset.
- Make the library look nice (no glass and metal) Brick and wood, vegetation, make it feel natural and living. Sustainable focus
- More green spaces, replace what will be lost/ removed and reinvent areas (both internal and external), be a local leader in adopting sustainable and environmental ideas (i.e. green roofing) into this project. This is one in a lifetime opportunity to do so.

- Open days / Displays to promote other cultural facilities such as HTC theatre and fire station (which should have been moved to the Woolworths site. NEVER MIND TOO LATE!
- Please fight for the best possible architectural outcome. One that the council and the community it represents can be proud to utilise.
- Below is just one blog story on the best libraries in Australia. The current renders accompanying the press for the Rosanna Library indicate a building that falls well short of what is possible with the appropriate design process.
- Some of the libraries I enjoy: Monash Caulfield library, Toorak/South Yarra library. Balwyn Library. Preston library
- The YPRL Website! It's awful. Please improve the website so that it is easier to find events by date/time OR by location. It's currently really messy to navigate.

# 4.4 Level of support and views about the proposed redevelopment of Rosanna Library

## Key insights

## The majority of participants indicated they were supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library and concept designs:


A majority of participants indicated they were supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library and concept designs:

- 48 (or 49.0%) were very supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 28 (or 28.6%) were supportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 5 (or 5.1%) were *neutral* about the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 5 (or 5.1%) were *unsupportive* of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library
- 12 (or 12.2%) were very unsupportive of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library

## Of the 98 respondents, 32 expressed *concerns* in the personalised responses explaining why participants answered this way:

- 3 of the very supportive responses indicated concerns about the partnership with Woolworths
- 7 of the *supportive* responses indicated concerns about the partnership with Woolworths and other aspects of the project
- 1 of the *neutral* responses indicated concerns about the value for money
- 5 of the *unsupportive* responses indicated concerns about the partnership with Woolworths and other aspects of the project
- 12 of the *very unsupportive* responses indicated they do not support, or have concerns about, selling public land and the Woolworths supermarket; and have concerns about the overall consultation process, project or concept design
- 4 of the *skipped* responses indicated concerns about the partnership with Woolworths and other aspects of the project

**Survey respondents** were asked "How supportive are you of the redevelopment of the Rosanna Library?". As shown in Graph 8, of the 98 respondents who answered this question, the majority indicated support. Forty-eight (or 49%) were very supportive and 28 (or 28.6%) were supportive. A total of 17 (or 17.3%) indicated no support.

## 4.5 Feedback on the concept designs and ideas


## Key insights

The majority of participants indicated they liked the Rosanna Library concept designs. A range of mixed views, ideas and queries were also recorded:


- 71 or (86.6%) indicated they like the concept designs
- Many of the 12 student participants indicated they preferred the *Deck* and *Study lounge spaces* (7 votes each) and *Children's areas* and *Reading terraces* (6 votes each)
- Other ideas included: Incorporating visual representation of Aboriginal Culture to uplift inclusion; natural building materials; quiet and noise tolerant areas; disabled parking near the lift; spaces for volunteers, tutors, professional services, wellness room and wet areas for art activities

**Pop-up engagement voting pod participants** were asked "How much do you like the Rosanna Library concept designs?" As shown in Graph 9, of the 82 participants who answered this question, the majority of participants aged under 18 years and 18 years and over indicated they liked the concept designs.





**School workshop participants and a teacher** were asked to indicate their preferred concept ideas and invited to allocate up to three voting dots. As shown in Graph 10, the majority of the 12 participants selected *Deck* and *Study lounge spaces (7 votes each)* and *Children's areas* and *Reading terraces (6 votes each)*.





At the **Rosanna Bowls Club drop in session, participants** were invited to ask questions and provide comments via feedback stations on *the Library redevelopment concept plans*. The eight participants provided 10 ideas and queries as shown below:

## <u>Ideas</u>

- Excited about the design, please use some natural building materials
- Need to create definite quiet and noise tolerant areas where tutoring lessons can take place
- Plenty of disabled parking spaces near the lift
- Room for volunteers tutors maths etc for local kids
- Small private space or room for people to meet with professional services eg: mental health case workers
- Useable community outdoor space
- Wellness room, yoga, meditation
- Wet area for art activities

#### **Queries**

- Need to see each aspect of the structure North and East side of Library
- What green strategies will be in place? What will be 4/5 star rating look like?

An email submission on behalf of families with children that identify as Aboriginal provided the following feedback: the children's library lacks visual representation of Aboriginal Culture. Suggestions for incorporating visual representation to uplift inclusion include:

- Adding Aboriginal art to the walls and signage
- Aboriginal design included in furnishings
- Koori corner in a small section of the library

# 4.6 Ideas about the streetscape and outdoor spaces at the proposed Rosanna Library

#### Key insights

Participants provided a variety of personalised ideas for the streetscape and outdoor spaces at the proposed Rosanna Library. Ideas and suggestions referred to the following topics (presented in descending order):

- Landscaping: Trees, vegetation and greenery
- Accessibility, pedestrian, bicycle and vehicles movements: Parking and car parks, pedestrian crossings, accessibility, cycling connections and infrastructure
- Building exterior and surrounds: Use of natural materials, re-purposing the blue stone, directional signage, welcoming appearance, artwork, flags, sustainability elements, dog parking and book return chute
- Outdoor spaces and facilities: Seating, green and open spaces, performing/entertainment area, play area/playground and café

Other ideas referred to topics including waste management and increasing the set back of the buildings from the road.

**Survey respondents** were asked "Do you have any ideas for the spaces and streetscape outside the library (eg. crossings, signage, trees, etc.)?" and invited to provide a personalised response. A total of 81 respondents answered this question and referred to 178 items.

- The question probably applies to the area in the immediate vicinity. However I am concerned for the viability of the shopping centre across the rail line. I wonder how, with the drawcard of a supermarket, the shopping area can be supported and connected and not be left to wither? I hope that that area is diverse enough and strong enough to survive.
- Open space, retaining the trees and land on the corner of Douglas Street. Do not sell the extra public land to Woolworths. Keep the current parcel of land and re-develop into a library and cultural hub with an outdoor space like Ivanhoe. Do not get into bed with Woolworths! The public land belongs to the residents of Rosanna. Anything other than an independent library re-development will ruin Rosanna.
- It would be great for the library to have a frontage to the street. It would be great if it was linked with a reading SOEA email in Rosanna parkland
- If Ellis Stones principals of landscaping of the Rosanna area could be used / acknowledged. Some mature / more developed native tree plantings. Minimal / subtle signage and or wayfinding.

At the **Rosanna Bowls Club drop in session, participants** were invited to ask questions and provide comments via a feedback station on *the streetscape, spaces outside, signage, car parking, crossings, trees etc.* The eight participants provided 29 comments, which are grouped by theme and presented verbatim in Table 16.

Five survey respondents who indicated they were **<u>unsupportive</u>** provided the following explanations:

- 1. There is something inherently wrong with the council partnering with Woolworths to provide this and the consultation process was deliberately lacking, which leads me to be suspicious and worried how other issues in Rosanna will be handled.
- 2. From the initial architectural renders, the quality of design appears poor. In principle, I am supportive of PPPs if it results in a good result for the community. I would expect the council to insist on an excellent architectural outcome from the PPP and strongly advocate for a formal design review process to ensure a quality result. IF there is currently no qualified in-house design review panel of respected architects, urban designers and place-makers within the council, engagement with the Office of Victorian Government Architect should be sought as a minimum requirement for such an important community project.
- 3. I would like the library to be redeveloped so that it meets the community's needs but feel that the space is inappropriate for a Woolworths of that size especially as there is a Woolworths on Rosanna Road. - 12. It is due for a redo. I'm not completely in love with the idea of it being attached to a Woolies/ BWS
- 13. Happy with the library development but concerned that Woolies will destroy the local shopping precinct and make parking worse
- 14. Library will be good but don't really want big woolies nearby
- 15. Don't approve Council joining with Woolies with this development as it affects other businesses in the area
- 16. I cannot understand the association with Woolworths, a corporation that already have a large supermarket in close proximity. This store would make 6 supermarkets in the area ... really ???? I can see that council has already sold its soul to developers, so why not a supermarket chain? I cannot bear to see the congestion this is going to cause. The only saving grace is that the theatre is staying!
- 17. I'm all for a new Library, but we don't need another supermarket in the area. There are plenty of supermarkets in this area or a short distance from the Rosanna Library. The council shouldn't be giving land to a private company.
- 18. The Woolworths, it will fill up the Rosanna station parking. And we don't need another supermarket
- 19. The larger store is definitely a different proposition to the original proposal.
- 20. We have significant concerns over the sale of land to expand the Woolworth store. The larger store is definitely a different proposition to the original proposal. Our key concern is the use of Douglas Street as the sole access to the car park and loading dock for deliveries, specifically it will; 1. Increase traffic in the quiet local street, especially outside of normal business hours where the supermarket will still be operating. 2. Increase noise with delivery trucks, cars, people accessing the store. 3. Lose privacy afforded by a quiet residential street. We believe these will directly and significantly affect our property and amenity.

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- 22. However I am concerned for the viability of the shopping centre across the rail line. I wonder how, with the drawcard of a supermarket, the shopping area can be supported and connected and not be left to wither? I hope that that area is diverse enough and strong enough to survive.
- 23. How will shopping trolleys be kept out of local parks?

- 27. This is not considering the effects of local businesses, community and street having heavy traffic volume due to Woolies

#### Concerns about loss of trees (11 responses)

- 1. The cutting down of so many trees and leaving the village bare with bright white and orange doesn't instill the community with much hope of Banyules ability not to destroy more of the village streetscape.
- 2. The nature connection, the concern about more rubbish and cars, pollution and no wildlife corridor and this reduces the appeal of our lovely suburb.
- 3. Keep trees, greenery landscaping outside
- 4. More green spaces, replace what will be lost/ removed and reinvent areas (both internal and external), be a local leader in adopting sustainable and environmental ideas (i.e. green roofing) into this project. This is one in a lifetime opportunity to do so.
- 5. As many of the mature trees saved as possible.
